On Sunday 20th March 2022 Air Marshal Sir Dusty Miller, one of our Vice-Patrons, became the High Sheriff of Gloucestershire for the coming year. At the Annual Legal Service in Gloucester Cathedral, he made a solemn declaration to 'truly and faithfully support the Judiciary and all who maintain The Queen's Peace, who administer justice, and who protect and support their fellow citizens'.

The High Sheriff, a role dating back over 1000 years, is appointed annually by The Queen and is the sovereign's representative for matters relating to the judiciary and the maintenance of law and order, though sadly Dusty is no longer empowered to raise the hue and cry to chase vagabonds (stand easy all ex-brats), as his medieval predecessors would have done. Luncheon boxes will be available in 1 Wing Mess from midday onwards and arrangements have been made for the Falcons to drop in before the traditional sunset ceremony and march past later in the afternoon. We are very pleased to announce that the Ceremonial Pipes and Drums of the RAF will be supporting the Golden Oldies and the distinctive rhythms of the Bear are sure to lift the hairs on the back of your necks!

This issue will contain the latest information about Reunion 2022 and documentation relating to our AGM planned for 24th September 2022 (more later). I have mentioned before in our Newsletters about members who have not adjusted their annual Membership dues to meet the arrangements agreed at AGM 2020. I regret that the time is now coming where almost 100 members will not be receiving the June issue of the Haltonian mentioned above. The cost of postage alone is almost £3.00, and the production costs are even higher. In 2020, we all agreed that to keep the high quality Haltonian magazine in hard copy form should be a priority of the Association. Council has therefore decided NOT to post out copies of the Magazine to members who have not updated their subscriptions, but their membership will NOT be cancelled. We will post out separately your AGM literature so you may participate in the AGM if you wish. Over the past 2 years, we have contacted everyone with a payment shortfall by letter; however, If you have any doubts about your annual remittance being correct, please contact Mike Colcomb (membership@rafhaa.co.uk).

While on this subject, might I say, there remain a very large number of Life members who continue to enjoy the magazine and other features of the Association at no cost beyond what they paid for Lifetime membership, many years ago. If you are one of these, may I suggest you consider inwardly the need to opt in for Heritage Life Membership at £15.00 per annum or do as some of your colleagues have done, and donate to cover magazine costs in this present day and age. Please contact Mike Colcomb if you wish to take either action.

Council has decided to opt for a hybrid AGM this year. That is, voting will be cast digitally and by post in advance of a face to face (f2f) meeting that will also be broadcast by video link. To ensure a complete viewing event, we plan to use St Georges Church as the venue. This will enable us to seat the Council around a conference table where members can be easily identified. We will use the church's catering facilities to provide pre meeting refreshments. More

information to follow in due course. This meeting will afford another chance to be entertained by the Golden Oldies.

Over the past year we have made regular pleas to membership inviting younger members to serve on the Council. Several of the current team are getting past our sell by date and new ideas and energy from younger members will help ensure our Heritage is in safe hands. Therefore, I am delighted to announce that three well qualified younger members have stepped forward in the last few months to take on important new council roles increasing the strength of the team that will have the onerous responsibility for Heritage when RAF Halton finally closes. At the Council meeting on 15th March 2022, it was unanimously agreed that Al Bennett (219 entry) would be co-opted to the Council as Apprentice Archivist and Rob Rodham (223 entry) be co-opted as Public Relations and Media Member (PR &MM) both with immediate effect. Both would be nominated by the Council for these roles at the 2022 AGM on 24th September. At the same AGM, Council will propose that Garron Clarke-Darby (222 entry) will replace Min Larkin (standing down) as Heritage Member. All three nominations are therefore subject to membership approval.

Alan Bennett joined 219 Entry in Oct 1970 as A Fitt (P) passing out in Oct 1972. Postings to Abingdon, Brize Norton, Laarbruch, Scampton and Binbrook culminated in arriving back at Brize for 14 years as Aircraft Ground Engineer on VC10 and finally 216 Sqn TriStars. Al left the RAF after 27yrs and commenced a second career in Power Generation at the Gas Power Station at Didcot followed by 10 years in corporate industrial Safety and Training. Married for 44 years with two grown up daughters and two grandsons Al is currently living in Carterton, Oxfordshire, within touching distance of Brize runway! Al joined the RAF Voluntary Band when at RAF Abingdon and has played in Brass Bands ever since. He currently plays and is on the committee of Witney Town Band. He learned to Tenpin Bowl at Jardines in Aylesbury (won first cup in 1971) and still bowls in the league at Astra Bowl Brize Norton. His interest in apprentice history was focussed when researching his father's wartime service and he was pleased to join Min Larkin and team at the Halton/RAFHAA Archive. He is very keen to pursue this aspect of our Heritage in the future.

Rob Rodham joined 223 Entry at Halton on 1 Jul 1971 as a Ground Electrician passing out in June 1973. Posted to Station workshops at Coningsby he later moved to 41 (F) Recce Sqn maintaining specialist photographic and associated equipment. Jan 1977 posted to 2 (AC) Sqn R.I.C. Laarbruch followed by a tour at TTTE Cottesmore in 1980 when the Tornados were arriving. Worked on selection of GSE for Tornado with various civilian manufacturers before instructing tradesmen on the new equipment. Left RAF in 1984. Rob became an instructor in Saudi-Arabia for BAC, followed with telecoms work with Siemens and Marconi. After being made redundant, Rob worked with various companies before becoming an instructor at Rolls-Royce, Derby where he achieved formal teaching and assessor qualifications. He retired (officially) in 2020 after employment with various colleges and training providers. Since then, Rob has been working 4-8 days a month undertaking End Point Assessments on behalf of two awarding bodies on apprentices at the end of their 3 or 4 year courses. Rob's skills will help the Association develop a STEM programme for youngsters as part of our Heritage commitment.

Garron Clark-Darby joined 222 Entry as a Craft Apprentice (Weapons) in 1971. After postings to Chivenor, Brawdy, Upavon, Gutersloh and Scampton he left the RAF in 1988. He discovered he had a talent for contractual matters and trained to become a Legal Adviser, working for Rediffusion Flight Simulators, ABB Robotics and Mercedes-Benz. Later, he also qualified as a Certified Data Protection Officer (DPO) and became Senior Legal Adviser and DPO for Deutsche Telekom, covering commercial and contract management, telecommunications licensing and data protection. Garron is married, with three adult children, and lives in Wing,

Buckinghamshire, where he provides armaments advice to the Wing Airfield Trust. In 2019, Garron became a volunteer at the Trenchard Museum, where he is now Assistant Curator. He still finds time to shoot his collection of military rifles and is a committee member for the Lee Enfield Rifle Association (LERA). He also enjoys driving his Austin Healey. Garron is ideally placed to take over from Min Larkin as our Heritage member.

One of our objectives as a charitable association is to make donations to suitable needy causes. At the Council Meeting on 15 th March, those attending agreed unanimously to gift £5k to the Disasters Emergency Committee who are working in conjunction with the British Red Cross Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal. We feel certain you will all endorse our action.
